Introduction & Land Acknowledgement

Since 1300 A.D., the Church has regularly celebrated Jubilee Years. For Jubilee 2025, Pope Francis has asked that around the world, Catholic bishops designate certain locations within their territories as Jubilee Sites.

This booklet may look like a tour guidebook, but it is far more than that. This is your pilgrim's guide to the Roman Catholic and Ukrainian Catholic churches, shrines, and grottos in southern Manitoba that have been designated as these uniquely special sites. The faithful are invited to make formal pilgrimages or simple pious visits to partake of a special outpouring of grace and mercy.

Within these pages, you will find a joint letter from our two Roman archbishops and our Ukrainian archeparch, the Jubilee Prayer composed by Pope Francis, a map of all the Jubilee Sites designated in southern Manitoba, detailed information on those sites, and a calendar of important dates for each of them.

We are a sacramental Church. This means that we make use of the physical world around us to reveal spiritual truths – the aroma of incense to lift our spirits in common prayer, the touch of ashes to remind us that we are dust and to dust we shall return, the peal of bells announcing the good news, the sublime beauty of sacred art expressing the mysteries of our faith, and, hidden behind the taste of simple bread and wine, an intimate encounter with the real person of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. Our churches, the physical places where all these senses come alive in Christ, are therefore very important to us as Catholics.

We are not alone in our love of sacred spaces. Our Indigenous brothers and sisters historically have loved this land long before Catholic missionaries came here. In the Law given to the Hebrews, the idea of a Jubilee Year was rooted in the equality of all people before God and in the restoration of our relationships with others and with the created world in the light of divine mercy (Leviticus 25:10-17).

In that spirit, we acknowledge that Manitoba is located on the Treaty Territories and ancestral lands of the Anishinaabeg, Inininew, Dakota, Dene, and Anisininew. We acknowledge that Manitoba is located on the national homeland of the Red River Métis, and we acknowledge that northern Manitoba includes lands that were and are the ancestral lands of the Inuit. We also acknowledge that our clean drinking water is sourced from Shoal Lake 40 First Nation. We acknowledge the validity of the Treaties made and Treaty Making and remain committed to working in partnership with First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people in the spirit of truth, reconciliation, and collaboration.

May we all be drawn to deeper communion with each other as we draw closer to our common Creator in Jubilee 2025.







To the Catholic faithful of the Archdiocese of Saint-Boniface, the Archdiocese of Winnipeg, and the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Winnipeg

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

May the hope of the risen Lord Jesus Christ be renewed in this Jubilee Year of 2025!

Pope Francis, in announcing this Jubilee, teaches us that "the Christian life is a journey calling for moments of greater intensity to encourage and sustain hope as the constant companion that guides our steps towards the goal of our encounter with the Lord Jesus." For a practical way of striving for these moments of greater intensity, he proposes that this year would have a special focus on the ancient custom of pilgrimages: "Pilgrimage is of course a fundamental element of every Jubilee event. Setting out on a journey is traditionally associated with our human quest for meaning in life. A pilgrimage on foot is a great aid for rediscovering the value of silence, effort and simplicity of life. In the coming year, pilgrims of hope will surely travel the ancient and more modern routes in order to experience the Jubilee to the full."

Southern Manitoba has a beautifully rich and diverse Catholic history in its Latin and Eastern rites. In addition to our respective Cathedral churches, we have designated other churches, shrines, and grottos that you will see detailed in this guide as Jubilee sites, making accessible to you the mercy of God, received through a plenary indulgence (see page 6 for the conditions and a short catechesis of the Church's teaching on indulgences). Each of these places of pilgrimage has special significance for the Church in southern Manitoba. Some of them were chosen for their proximity to the distant borders of our vast archdioceses. Others already have more than a century of history as pilgrimage sites and were obvious choices. Yet others are shrines with first class relics of their patron saints, including the Bishop Velychkovsky National Martyr's Shrine, the only national shrine in Western Canada.

We encourage Catholics, individually and as families, organizations, and parish communities, to organize pilgrimages to at least one of these sites in 2025. Our priests have been asked to widen their availability to celebrate the sacrament of reconciliation, providing Catholics with the opportunity to gain the Jubilee indulgence as they make prayerful visits to specific pilgrimage sites, and practice works of mercy during this holy year. The love, grace, and mercy of God is waiting to be poured into our hearts in this Jubilee of 2025. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with confidence!

Catechesis on the Jubilee Indulgence

During the Jubilee Year 2025, Pope Francis is inviting all Christians to experience God's love and mercy more deeply. This Jubilee is a time of reflection, repentance, and renewal, especially in a world still facing violence and suffering. The Holy Father emphasizes the importance of hope and mercy, urging people to rediscover the signs of God's presence in the world today.

One of the central elements of the holy year is the Jubilee Plenary Indulgence, a special grace offered to the faithful. The Indulgence is linked to God's infinite mercy and is seen as a way for individuals to experience the forgiveness of sins. The Indulgence can be granted to those who are truly repentant and have purified their souls through the Sacrament of Penance and Holy Communion, and who offer prayers for the intentions of the Pope. It can be applied to help souls in Purgatory as well.

This is how an indulgence is defined in the Catechism of the Catholic Church:

"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints." (CCC 1471)

Ways to Obtain the Jubilee Indulgence

Pilgrimages

Pilgrims may obtain the Jubilee Indulgence by visiting specific sacred places, such as the four Major Papal Basilicas in Rome (St. Peter's in the Vatican, St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, St. Paul's Outside the Walls) or other designated pilgrimage sites worldwide, including Cathedral churches and other designated churches, shrines, and grottos such as those noted in this Pilgrim's Guide. Devoutly participating in Holy Mass and other spiritual activities like the Via Crucis (Way of the Cross), the Marian Rosary, the recitation of the Akathist hymn, praying for the intentions of the Pope, and celebrating the Sacrament of Penance (Confession) will help pilgrims receive the Jubilee Indulgence.

Pious Visits to Sacred Places

Likewise, the Jubilee Indulgence may be obtained by visiting designated sacred places for Eucharistic adoration, prayer, and meditative reflection. This can be done individually or in groups and should include praying the Our Father (Lord's Prayer), praying for the intentions of the Pope, the Profession of Faith in any legitimate form, and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God.

Works of Mercy and Penance

In addition, acts of mercy and works of charity, such as visiting the sick, prisoners, the lonely, or feeding the hungry and assisting the poor and others in need can lead to the Indulgence. The faithful are encouraged to practice penance and offer personal sacrifice, including fasting in various forms, avoiding futile distractions, supporting the defense and protection of human life, and donating money to help those in need.

Special Considerations

Those who cannot travel, such as the sick, elderly, or imprisoned, may receive the Jubilee Indulgence by spiritually uniting themselves with the holy year celebrations through prayer and offering up their sufferings. The faithful can receive the Jubilee Indulgence twice in one day if they receive Holy Communion a second time and have specifically carried out an act of charity for the souls in Purgatory.

Additional Opportunities

Priests have been asked to widen their availability to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance during the Jubilee Year. Such opportunities will be announced for the seasons of Lent and Advent and, as the year unfolds, for additional pilgrimage events within the Roman Catholic Archdioceses of St. Boniface and Winnipeg, and the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Winnipeg. In addition, each archbishop on appropriate days and occasions will announce further opportunities in which they will impart the Papal Blessing with the attached plenary indulgence, obtainable by the faithful who receive this Blessing under the usual conditions.

Upon the arrival of Abbé Provencher in 1818, construction began of a house measuring 50 feet by 30 feet, which served as a chapel, residence, and school. It was replaced by a larger building in 1825. The third church, the first one designated as a Cathedral, had its first stone laid in 1832 and was opened for worship in 1839. It was destroyed by fire in 1860, taking with it the documents of the history of the mission since its beginnings.

In 1862, Monseigneur Taché built the fourth cathedral with a single steeple measuring 150 by 60 feet. In 1905, the cathedral had become too small, so Bishop Langevin began construction of a new cathedral. This impressive Romanesque Revival cathedral, built at great expense in the early 20th century, quickly became an object of pride for the local francophone population, who saw it as one of the finest achievements of their survival in a minority environment.

The building's consecration as a minor basilica on June 10, 1949, gave it even greater value. For a long time, it was the largest religious building in Western Canada. To the dismay of the francophone population, who saw it as a symbol of their vitality, a violent fire devastated it on July 22, 1968.

Conscious of the symbolic importance of this site, architect Étienne Gaboury designed a new cathedral in 1970 within the old walls. In this way, he preserved the heritage value of the site that has housed two churches and four successive cathedrals. This church was blessed on July 17, 1972. The site of the Cathedral Basilica of Saint-Boniface, designated a provincial heritage site of Manitoba in February 1994, is visited by thousands of people each year. It perpetuates the heritage value of this highly symbolic place of the Francophone presence in

the West.

The community began gathering for Mass in 1869, celebrated by Father Joseph McCarthy, O.M.I., in a rented house at the corner of Notre Dame Avenue and Victoria Street. In 1874 the Mission was moved to a church-rectory built "in the midst of a vacant field" - the current property along St. Mary Avenue. The building was blessed by Archbishop Tache on 30 May 1874 and Father J.B. Beaudin, O.M.I. was the first pastor. On 16 April 1876, Archbishop Tache raised the mission to the canonical status of a parish under the title and patronage of "The Most Holy Name of Mary".

A more permanent church was blessed by Archbishop Tache on 4 September 1881. It was solemnly consecrated and dedicated on 25 September 1887 by Archbishop Edouard-Charles Fabre of Montreal, invited to preside by Archbishop Tache. On 8 December 1918, Most Reverend Alfred Arthur Sinnott designated Saint Mary's Church as the Cathedral church of the recently-formed

Archdiocese of Winnipeg.

A new Administration Centre and Parish Hall were constructed in 1966. Major repairs were made to the structure of the cathedral in 1954-1955 and to the superstructure of the building in 1957, 1971-1973 and again in 1987. A large Baptismal Font was completed by Holy Saturday of 2003.



The Sts. Volodymyr and Olha Ukrainian Catholic Metropolitan Cathedral is a place that represents determination and hope for people who immigrated to Canada from Ukraine in the early 1890's. The current Cathedral church is the third Church for the parish. Construction of this structure began in 1947. The cornerstone for this new Cathedral was blessed in September 1948 by Apostolic Exarch of Canada for Ukrainian Catholics, Basil Ladyka. On April 15, 1951 the Cathedral was officially opened by Cardinal James McGuigan of Toronto, assisted by Archbishop Ladyka.

On November 3, 1956, Pope Pius XII created the Metropolitan See for the Ukrainian Catholics of Canada, Today, this magnificent spiritual gathering place features religious art of paintings, stained glass windows and icons. The stained glass windows depict the Church history of Ukraine and were created by world renowned artist and immigrant Dr. Leo Mol.

Sts. Volodymyr and Olha Cathedral was honoured and blessed to have Pope John Paul II stop for prayer during his visitation in 1984. The chair and kneeler used by Saint John Paul remain in the Cathedral for veneration.

Over the past few years, the Cathedral has become of place of prayers and support for the thousands of Ukrainians that have fled from Ukraine during this time of war. There are displays in the Cathedral to encourage pilgrims to pray, especially for all those that have made sacrifices and are suffering because of the tragedy of war.


The twentieth century is known as a century of martyrs. Millions of people gave up their lives for Christ. In the Soviet Union under the atheistic regime many Christians, especially Ukrainian Catholics lay down their lives rather than deny Jesus Christ and his Church. Honouring this sacrifice, Pope John Paul II beatified a number of martyrs for the Ukrainian Catholic Church on June 27, 2001. Among the martyrs was the Redemptorist Bishop, Vasyl Velychkovsky, C.Ss.R.

Bishop Vasyl's life in Ukraine was under authoritarian aesthetic regime. He was spied upon, threatened, arrested, thrown in prison, sentenced to death and tortured. Yet throughout his life his focus was on God and his conviction to his Catholic faith. He managed to establish and inspire others to lead the underground church in Ukraine. Arrested again in 1969, Bishop Vasyl spent three years in prison undergoing horrific chemical induced torture. He survived his sentence but was exiled from Ukraine without any possibility of ever returning. In 1972, Metropolitan Maxim Hermaniuk, C.Ss.R. brought him to Winnipeg. Overcome by the tortures and death causing drugs Bishop Vasyl received while in prison, he died a martyr's death on June 30, 1973 in Winnipeg.

Upon the announcement of Bishop Vasyl's beatification in 2001, plans were underway for the exhumation of Blessed Vasyl's remains. The body of Blessed Vasyl was exhumed on September 16, 2002. Following Vatican protocol, a team of doctors and church personnel examined the contents and found the body to be fully intact. His holy body was re-vested with new vestments and sealed in a stainless steel sarcophagus.

On September 22, 2002, Blessed Vasyl's holy relics were enshrined in a chapel in St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Church in Winnipeg. Since then, pilgrims come to pray, seeking the powerful intercession of Blessed Vasyl. Many blessings of inspiration, hope and healing have been received.

In 1824 a group of Métis settled in the area and, in the same year, a priest from St. Boniface celebrated Christmas Mass for them. 1857 saw the building of the first church, which was moved a number of times until its completion in 1861.

In 1866 Father Camper, O.M.I. arrived from France and, during his twenty-year tenure, planned the building of a larger church, a number of school buildings and a new rectory. In 1870 the first school opened and in 1873 a larger wooden church with a thatched roof was completed and served the community until 1895. Archbishop Langevin of St. Boniface blessed the new church on 20 June 1895. In 1911 a 110-foot steeple was added to the church structure to house the new bell.

On 31 May 1961 a lightning bolt struck the church, burning it to the ground. Plans for a new church were drawn up shortly after the fire, and Archbishop Flahiff blessed the current church on 24 May 1964.

The Parish of St-François-Xavier is the second oldest parish in both the Province of Manitoba and in all of the western provinces. As such, it is the oldest parish in the Archdiocese of Winnipeg.

The mission was first established in 1824 by Archbishop Provencher of St. Boniface. In 1828 the settlers built a log chapel, and when this was quickly outgrown a new chapel was constructed in time for Mass on Christmas Eve of 1833. The mission was raised to the status of a parish on 1 January 1834 and was dedicated to St.-François-Xavier in 1854, the patron saint of Father F. X. Kavanagh, the second and longest-serving pastor of the parish.

On 19 June 1872, Archbishop Taché, O.M.I. blessed a new bell for the church, which weighed 375 pounds. The bell was baptized and blessed with the name "Marie-Francois-Xavier". The present church was built to replace the aging former church, and was blessed on 4 December 1900 by Archbishop Langevin.

St. Norbert Parish was the second parish opened in the Archdiocese St. Boniface. The Grey Nuns and the Metis were very instrumental in the early history of this parish. The Sisters of Mercy operated the Ritchot orphanage La Crèche from 1903 to 1948.

The current church is the third one built on the site, erected in 1937. The grounds feature an exterior chapel, La chapelle de Notre-Dame-du-Bon-Secours, blessed in 1875 and still frequently visited by the faithful.


Located at a crucial settlement on Dawson Road, one of the earliest surveyed paths between Lake Superior and the Red River, this parish has roots back to 1859, when Archbishop Taché assigned Fr. Jean-Marie Le Floch to minister to the growing population.

It has been served by the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, the Grey Nuns, and the Redemptorists throughout its history. The first priest born in Manitoba, Fr. Louis de Gonzague Bélanger, was born here in 1879.

Archbishop Taché led a group of 700 pilgrims here in 1888, and starting in 1898, the year the church was finished being built, regular pilgrimages were made by train. Many miraculous healings were reported on these pilgrimages. In 1995, the parishes and missions from Richer, Ste. Geneviève, Hadashville, and Ross were merged with the Ste. Anne parish.

The first recorded Mass offered on the site of the present City of Brandon was celebrated in 1880 by Bishop Isidore Clut, 0.M.I., Auxiliary Vicar-Apostolic of Athabaska-Mackenzie, as he was returning to his Vicariate from Europe. In 1881 Mass was offered regularly in a canvas tent on the "Flats", but in the summer of 1882 Mass was celebrated in the home of a Baptist gentleman, Mr. Ezechial Evans, until a small frame church was built near 4th Street and Lorne Avenue.

The parish was canonically erected on 6 December 1883 under the patronage of St. Augustine, the second Archbishop of Canterbury. For many years the priests of the parish were responsible for the faithful in almost all of Western Manitoba and into Saskatchewan as far as Estevan and Weyburn.

The Belgian Redemptorist Fathers built a monastery in 1899 and began the construction of the present church at 4th Street and Lorne Avenue in 1902. It was consecrated by Archbishop Langevin on 29 August 1903. The church was said to have cost \$135,000, most of the money having been donated by relatives of Father Guillaume Godt, C.Ss.R. Father Godt, the first Redemptorist pastor and his successor, Father Henri Ristvelt, are buried in vaults under the church.

Ste-Rose-de-Lima Parish has its origins in 1889 when a group of pioneers settled on the banks of the Turtle River. A small church was built, and an Oblate missionary made visits to celebrate Mass and the sacraments. Beginning 23 March 1890 Father Joseph-Alexis Magnan, O.M.I. was appointed resident priest of the mission. In 1895 it was raised to the status of a parish and officially dedicated to St. Rose of Lima.

By 1898 the mission numbered some 700 people and a new and larger church was built. It was destroyed by fire on 25 January 1915. A third church was built and completed in time for Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve of that same year. On 27 July 1959 disaster struck again and the church burnt to the ground. The new, present church was blessed by Archbishop Flahiff on 17 September 1961.

Upon entering the town of Saint-Rose from Highway 5, one can see the Grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes. This was built to commemorate the Centenary of the Apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St. Bernadette Soubirous in 1858. It was blessed on the same day as the new church in 1961.

The first church of Saint-Claude was built in 1893 in the heart of the village, now the site of the Canada-France Cenotaph and the original parish cemetery. It was replaced in 1911 by a second gothic style church on a lot next to the current community hall.

The unique external and exterior style and architecture of the current church, built in 1965, was inspired by the new norms on the Liturgy of the Second Vatican Council, and designed by renowned architect Étienne Gaboury. Mounted in the church bell tower is the bell of the first church, christened Claudia, by Archbishop Adélard Langevin in 1897, to hold its place of honour in the parish.

The steeple of the second church stands as a memorial in an oak park on the church grounds. It is said that the former steeple and Claudia were like a beacon in the heart of the prairies.

The grotto, situated on the grounds of the former convent of the Filles de la Croix and next to the site of the first church, is an oasis for meditation, reflection and prayer. It is a replica of the grotto in Lourdes in the French Pyrenees. It was built in recognition of the extraordinary contributions to Saint-Claude of Sr. Marie Adélard, f.d.l.c, exactly one hundred years after the apparitions of the Immaculate Conception in the grotto in Lourdes, France.

On 20 April 1898, Archbishop Langevin of St. Boniface appointed Rev. Wojeiech Kulawy. O.M.I. pastor of the Polish, German, Czech, Slovak and Ukrainian people. He arrived in Winnipeg on 6 May 1898, and his brother Rev. Jan Kulawy arrived a year later on 8 May. 1899.

The Archbishop, recognizing the specific needs and hardships of economics, language, and culture facing these new immigrants, gave permission for the establishment of a new parish dedicated to the Holy Ghost. The first Mass was celebrated in the new church on All Saints Day, 1 November 1899 and the church was consecrated on 3 June 1900.

The Parish was honoured by the visit of Karol Cardinal Wojtyla, Archbishop of Krakow who celebrated Mass in the church on 8 September 1969 and the Fathers and parishioners rejoiced at his election as Pope John Paul II in 1978. Saint Theresa of Calcutta participated in Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in the church on June 25, 1985.

In the early 1980s the decision was made to demolish the historic church and build a new parish complex with church, offices, and rectory. This new building was completed in June 1987. The side chapel in the new church is a replica of the old church and contains many of its original furnishings. The new sanctuary furnishings were designed and purchased to be first used at the Mass celebrated by Pope John Paul II in Birds Hill Park on 16 September 1984, before being installed in the



present church.

A seminarian in France named Ernest-Abel Noret faced health challenges that made him fear that the road to the priesthood would be closed to him, but he made a promise to Our Lady that he would honour her if he survived. He did survive and was ordained in 1890.

Upon being assigned as pastor at St. Malo Parish, he built a small Marian shrine at this site in 1896 in fulfillment of his promise. Over the next several years parishioners helped him to upgrade the site. On June 5, 1906, Archbishop Langevin presided over a pilgrimage to the grotto and blessed its new chapel.

In the 1930s, the site became very popular as a pilgrimage, with over 7000 people coming in 1939. The devotion was formalized with the second diocesan synod in 1951 decreeing that it would be a regional pilgrimage site, and in 2019 Archbishop LeGatt decreed that it would be an archdiocesan sanctuary and the site of the annual archdiocesan pilgrimage.

St. Mary Parish began as a mission region, with priests from St. Boniface traveling to the area to serve the spiritual needs of local Catholics, saying Mass in their homes. It was formally organized into a parish with its first resident priest, Fr. Roche Margos, in 1909.

The formal title of the parish is B. M. V. Reginae Poloniae (Blessed Virgin Mary Queen of Poland) but is now known more commonly as St. Mary. The parish was served Oblates of Mary Immaculate until 1924. It was later served by the English and Polish bilingual La Salette Missionary Fathers until 1987, and afterwards by the St. Boniface's diocesan and international priests. In 1950, a replica of France's Shrine to our Lady of La Salette was built, which has been the site of annual pilgrimages every September.

Notre-Dame-du-Laus was built largely from the financial contributions of a visiting priest from Montreal, Msgr. Henri Bernard, in thanks for the great hospitality he had been shown during his stay. His only condition was that the parish be named in honour of Notre-Dame-du-Laus, "Refuge of sinners."

The church construction was started in 1950 and finished in 1959. When Msgr. Bernard died in 1951, he was entombed, at his request, within a vault in the basement wall.

Archbishop Cabana directed that an annual pilgrimage be made to this site, and the first one was held on June 27, 1954. The grotto behind the church was finished in 1960.

Rev. Philip Ruh, OMI, a Beiglan Missionary, who early in life converted to the Eastern Rite Ukrainian Catholic Church, designed and led the construction of the Immaculate Conception Church in Cooks Creek, Manitoba. Father Ruh, an architect, first started to build the beautiful "Prairie Cathedral" in 1930 during The Great Depression. Dedicated volunteer parishioners enabled the vision of Father Ruh to come to life over the following 22 years and in 1952 it was finally completed and consecrated. In 1954, the construction of the Grotto, a replica of the Lady of Lourdes Grotto in France, began with the first pilgrimage taking place that year. Following the death of Father Ruh in 1962, the St. Josaphat Knights of Columbus Council facilitated the completion of the Grotto in 1967.

The parishloners of Immaculate Conception Church and Grotto, welcome pilgrims to their annual Pilgrimage every August to celebrate the Feast of the Dormition of the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 15). The Pilgrimage takes place the weekend of, or following the feast day (Scheduled for August 15, 16, and 17, 2025). Weather permitting, services are held outside in the Grotto. The Pilgrimage starts Friday evening with praying the Rosary, followed by a Hierarchical Divine Liturgy (Ukrainian) and Akathist to the Mother of God. Saturday includes a Pilgram Walk, Stations of the Cross and a Divine Liturgy (English). On Sunday, the morning starts with a Panakhyda & Blessing of the grave of the Very Rev. Philip Ruh, OMI, followed by a Hierarchical Divine Liturgy (Ukrainian/English) and anointing. A fellowship follows all of the services.

As a designated Provincial Historical Site of Manitoba and National Historic Site of Canada, the Immaculate Conception Church and Grotto offers visitors an opportunity to pray, learn and reflect on the history of the parish and Ukrainian Catholic faith.

Fr. Wladyslaw Panek was the first Polish priest to organize the Poles in St. Boniface while he was a hospital chaplain between 1943-1952. He was succeeded by Fr. Wladyslaw Parsyka.

The church's cornerstone was blessed by Archbishop Baudoux on Nov 1, 1953. In 2007, Archbishop Goulet asked the parish priest, Fr. Sebastian Gacki, to travel to Poland to bring back first class relics of St. Faustina for the parish, and the parish was dedicated as a Shrine of the Divine Mercy on April 15, 2007. The parish also holds relics of Pope St. John Paul II.

Beginning in 1962, the Saint John Bosco Centre at 87 Isabel Street served spiritual and community development needs for Indigenous and Metis Catholics. The Centre had largely closed by 1975, but in June 1978, Sister Florence Leduc, CSC, came to meet with community members to listen to their needs and ideas. After this meeting, the advice was shared with Cardinal Flahiff, and the Oblate Fathers (who provided ministry to the community) that the group desired what other ethnic groups in Winnipeg had: a parish and church of their own.

Starting in March 1979, Sunday catechism classes began again with indigenous catechists, a prayer group was organized, and Masses were resumed. Paroisse du Sacré-Coeur (located then at 597 Bannatyne Avenue) agreed to share their priests and church building, renting rooms to serve as offices for the new Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha mission.

In 1990, the building at 794 Ellice Avenue and 548 Home Street was purchased to become the new parish location, and the mission was canonically erected as an independent parish in 1992. With the Saint's canonization in 2012, the parish name changed to Saint Kateri Tekakwitha. In 2021, the parish moved to their current home on Flora Avenue to better serve their community members.


